Legislation and guidance

By law all children of compulsory school age must receive an appropriate full-time education (Education Act 1996). Parents have a legal duty to ensure their child attends school regularly at the school at which they are registered.

Parents may be recognised differently under education law, than under family law. Section 576 of the Education Act 1996 states that a 'parent', in relation to a child or young person, includes any person who is not a parent (from which can be inferred 'biological parent') but who has parental responsibility, or who has care of the child.

A person typically has care of a child or young person if they are the person with whom the child lives, either full or part time and who looks after the child, irrespective of what their biological or legal relationship is with the child.

There is no entitlement in law for pupils to take time off during the term to go on holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure or recreation, or to take part in protest activity in school hours.

Introduction

Attending school regularly and on time has a positive impact on learning, progress and therefore the best life chances for pupils. Research shows that attendance and punctuality are important factors in school success.

The school recognises that positive behaviour and good attendance are essential in order for pupils to get the most of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing and wider life chances. We believe that in order to facilitate teaching and learning, good attendance is essential. Pupils cannot achieve their full potential if they do not regularly attend school. Missing out on lessons leaves children very vulnerable to falling behind. Children with poor attendance tend to achieve less through their education.

We take a whole-school approach to securing good attendance and recognise the impact that our efforts in other areas – such as the curriculum, behaviour standards, bullying, SEND support, pastoral support, safeguarding and the effective use of resources such as pupil premium – can have on improving pupil attendance.

For our children to gain the greatest benefit from their education it is vital that they attend regularly and be at school, on time, every day the school is open unless the reason for the absence is unavoidable.

It is a rule of this school that pupils must attend every day, unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Aims

This policy aims to show our commitment to meeting our obligations with regards to school attendance, including those laid out in the Department for Education's (DfE's) statutory guidance on [working together to improve school attendance](#) through our whole-school culture and ethos that values good attendance, including:

- Setting high expectations for the attendance and punctuality of all pupils.
- Promoting good attendance and the benefits of good attendance.
- Reducing absence, including persistent and severe absence.
- Ensuring every pupil has access to the full-time education to which they are entitled.
- Acting early to address patterns of absence.
- Building strong relationships with families in order to work effectively with parents, pupils, and partners to make sure pupils have the support in place to attend school.
- Improving children's attainment through good attendance.

Roles and responsibilities

The **governing body** is responsible for:

- Recognising and promoting the importance of school attendance across the school's policies and ethos.
- Making sure school leaders fulfil expectations and statutory duties, including:
 - Making sure the school records attendance accurately in the register, and shares the required information with the DfE and local authority.
 - Making sure the school works effectively with local partners to help remove barriers to attendance, and keeps them informed regarding specific pupils, where appropriate.
- Regularly reviewing and challenging attendance data and helping school leaders focus improvement efforts on individual pupils or cohorts who need it most.
- Ensuring all staff receive adequate training on attendance, so they understand:
 - The importance of good attendance.
 - That absence is almost always a symptom of wider issues.
 - The school's legal requirements for keeping registers.
 - The school's strategies and procedures for tracking, following up on and improving attendance, including working with partners and keeping them informed regarding specific pupils, where appropriate.

- Making sure dedicated training is provided to staff with a specific attendance function in their role, including in interpreting and analysing attendance data.
- Setting high expectations of all school leaders, staff, pupils and parents.
- Making sure the school's attendance management processes are delivered effectively, and that consistent support is provided for pupils who need it most by prioritising staff and resources.
- Making sure the school has high aspirations for all pupils, but adapts processes and support to pupils' individual needs.
- Working with school leaders to set goals or areas of focus for attendance and providing support and challenge.
- Monitoring attendance figures for the whole school and repeatedly evaluating the effectiveness of the school's processes and improvement efforts to make sure they are meeting pupils' needs.
- Where the school is struggling with attendance, working with school leaders to develop a comprehensive action plan to improve attendance.
- Holding the headteacher to account for the implementation of this policy.

The **headteacher** is responsible for:

- The implementation of this policy at the school.
- Monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors.
- Monitoring the impact of any implemented attendance strategies.
- Issuing fixed-penalty notices, where necessary, and/or authorising the deputy headteacher to be able to do so.
- Communicating the school's high expectations for attendance and punctuality regularly to pupils and parents through all available channels.

The **designated senior leader responsible for attendance** (also known as the '**Senior Attendance Champion**') is responsible for:

- Leading, championing and improving attendance across the school.
- Supporting staff with monitoring the attendance of individual pupils.
- Setting a clear vision for improving and maintaining good attendance.
- Evaluating and monitoring expectations and processes.
- Having a strong grasp of absence data and oversight of absence data analysis.
- Regularly monitoring and evaluating progress in attendance.
- Establishing and maintaining effective systems for tackling absence, and making sure they are followed by all staff.
- Liaising with pupils, parents and external agencies, where needed.
- Building close and productive relationships with parents to discuss and tackle attendance issues.
- Creating intervention or reintegration plans in partnership with pupils and their parents.
- Delivering targeted intervention and support to pupils and families.

The **special educational needs co-ordinator (SENCo)** is responsible for:

- Working with the parents of pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND) to develop specific support approaches for attendance for pupils with SEND, including where pupils with SEND face in-school barriers.
- Communicating with the local authority when a pupil with an education, health and care (EHC) plan has falling attendance, or where there are barriers to attendance that relate to the pupil's needs.

Class teachers (or those covering in place of a class teacher) are responsible for:

- Recording attendance for both morning and afternoon sessions on a daily basis, using the correct codes and submitting this information to the school office via SIMS.

The **office staff** will:

- Take calls/receive emails from parents about absence on a day-to-day basis and record it on the school system.
- Transfer calls from parents to the relevant person (phase leader, SENCo, Senior Attendance Champion etc.) where appropriate, in order to provide them with more detailed support on attendance.
- Inform the local authority of any pupil being deleted from the admission and attendance registers.

Parents are expected to:

- Make sure their child attends every day on time.
- Call or email the school to report their child's absence before 8:55am on the day of the absence, and each subsequent day of absence, and advise when they are expected to return.
- Ensure their child returns to school as soon as possible and they provide any medical evidence, if requested, to support the absence. Medical evidence may be requested where their child is having multiple periods of absence which are reported as being due to medical reasons. When determining whether a child is too ill to attend school, both parents and school staff can consider the following NHS advice [Is my child too ill for school?](#)
- Provide the school with accurate and up-to-date contact details, including more than one emergency contact number for their child.
- Ensure that, where possible, appointments for their child are made outside of the school day.
- Follow the procedure for signing their child in and out if arriving late or leaving early.
- Keep to any attendance contracts that they make with the school and/or local authority.
- Seek support, where necessary, for maintaining good attendance, by contacting the school on 01525 713625 or emailing office@templefield-lower.co.uk.
- Work with the school and local authority to address any attendance concerns. Parents should proactively engage with the support offered, aiming to resolve any problems together. This is nearly always successful. If difficulties cannot be resolved in this way, the school may consider more formal support and/or refer the child to the local authority. If attendance does not improve, legal action may be taken in the form of a Penalty Notice or prosecution in the Magistrates Court.

The law entitles every child of compulsory school age to an efficient, full-time education suitable to their age, aptitude, and any special educational need they may have. It is the legal responsibility of every parent to make sure their child receives that education, either by attendance at a school or by education otherwise than at a school.

Pupils are expected to:

- Attend school every day, on time.

The **School Attendance Officer** is responsible for:

- Monitoring and analysing attendance data.
- Benchmarking attendance data to identify areas of focus for improvement.
- Providing regular attendance reports to school staff and reporting concerns about attendance to the designated senior leader responsible for attendance, and the headteacher.
- Working with education welfare officers to tackle persistent absence.
- Advising the headteacher/deputy headteacher (authorised by the headteacher) when to issue fixed-penalty notices.

Recording attendance

Attendance register

The school uses an electronic attendance register (SIMS), and places all pupils onto this register. It will be completed using the appropriate national attendance and absence codes from the [School Attendance \(Pupil Registration\) \(England\) Regulations 2024](#), whether every pupil is:

- Present
- Attending an approved off-site educational activity
- Absent
- Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances

When staff are completing the register, they will use the N code to signify that a pupil is not present. This will be followed up by the office staff. Any amendment to the attendance register will include:

- The original entry
- The amended entry
- The reason for the amendment

- The date on which the amendment was made
- The name and position of the person who made the amendment

We will also record:

- Whether the absence is authorised or not
- The nature of the activity, where a pupil is attending an approved educational activity
- The nature of circumstances, where a pupil is unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances

We will keep every entry on the attendance register for 6 years after the date on which the entry was made.

Lateness and punctuality

Poor punctuality is not acceptable and can sometimes lead to irregular school attendance patterns. Good time-keeping is a vital life skill which will help children as they progress through their school life and out into the wider world.

Pupils who arrive late disrupt lessons and, if a child misses the start of the day, they can feel unsettled and embarrassed and risk missing vital work and important messages from their class teacher.

The times of the start and close of the school day are:

Gates open: 8:45am

Gates close and registration starts: 8:55am

Registration closes: 9:15am

Second registration of the day: 1:05pm for Nursery, Reception and Year 1 (1:20pm for Years 2 – 4)

End of the school day: 3:20pm for Reception and KS1 (3:30pm for Nursery and KS2).

A pupil who arrives late (after 8.55am once the school doors have closed) will be recorded as N by the member of staff in class. The following will therefore apply:

- The parent will be expected to sign the child in at the office, providing a reason for their lateness.
- If they arrive before the register has closed (9.15am) they will be marked as late, using the appropriate code (L).
- If they arrive after the register has closed (9.15am) they will be marked (U) to show they are on site for safeguarding reasons but this will **not** count as a present mark and it will mean that they have an unauthorised absence.

From time to time, the headteacher will undertake a 'Late Gate' check, greeting late arrivals at the main entrance to the school.

Unauthorised lateness could result in the school referring to the local authority for sanctions and/or legal proceedings. If your child has a persistent lateness record, you may be asked to meet with the headteacher, but you can approach us at any time if you are having difficulties getting your child to school on time.

Understanding types of absence – authorised and unauthorised absence

Every half-day absence from school has to be classified by the school, as either **authorised** or **unauthorised**. This is why information about the cause of any absence is always required. Each half-day is known as a 'session'.

Authorised absences are morning or afternoon sessions away from school for a genuine reason such as illness (although you may be asked to provide medical evidence for your child before this can be authorised), medical or dental appointments which unavoidably fall in school time, emergencies or other unavoidable causes.

Other valid reasons for **authorised absence** include (but are not limited to):

- Religious observance – where the day is exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the pupil's parent(s) belong(s). If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parent's religious body to confirm whether the day is set apart.
- Parent(s) travelling for occupational purposes – this covers Roma, English and Welsh gypsies, Irish and Scottish travellers, showmen (fairground people) and circus people, bargees (occupational boat dwellers) and new travellers. Absence may be authorised only when a traveller

family is known to be travelling for occupational purposes and has agreed this with the school, but it is not known whether the pupil is attending educational provision.

- If the pupil is currently suspended or excluded from school (and no alternative provision has been made).

Unauthorised absences are those which the school does not consider reasonable and for which no 'leave' has been granted. This type of absence can lead to the school referring to the local authority for penalty notices and/or legal proceedings.

Unauthorised absence includes (but are not limited to):

- Parents keeping children off school unnecessarily e.g. because they had a late night or for non-infectious illness or injury that would not affect their ability to learn
- Absences which have never been properly explained
- Children who arrive at school after the close of registration are marked using a 'U'. This indicates that they are in school for safeguarding purposes, however is counted as an absence for the session.
- Shopping trips
- Looking after other children or children accompanying siblings or parents to medical appointments
- Their own or family birthdays
- Holidays taken during term time, not deemed 'for exceptional purposes' by the headteacher, including any arranged by other family members or friends
- Day trips
- Other leave of absence in term time which has not been agreed

Reporting planned and unplanned absence

Planned absence

Attending a medical or dental appointment will be counted as authorised as long as the pupil's parent **notifies the school in advance** of the appointment with the details. This can be done by contacting the school office on 01525 713625 or via email office@templefield-lower.co.uk.

However, we encourage parents to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary.

Unplanned absence

The pupil's parent must notify the school of the reason for the absence on the first day (and each subsequent day of absence) of an unplanned absence by 8.55am, or as soon as practically possible, by calling the school office on 01525 713625 or emailing office@templefield-lower.co.uk.

We will mark absence due to illness as authorised, unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.

Where the absence is longer than 5 days, or there are doubts about the authenticity of the illness, the school may ask for medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence. We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised and parents will be notified of this in advance.

Following up unexplained absence

Where any pupil we expect to attend school does not attend, or stops attending, without reason, the school will:

- Call the pupil's parent on the morning of the first day of unexplained absence to ascertain the reason. If the school cannot reach any of the pupil's emergency contacts, the school may visit the home or contact the relevant professionals, such as the police or safeguarding team.
- Identify whether the absence is approved or not.
- Identify the correct attendance code to use and input it as soon as the reason for absence is ascertained – this will be no later than 5 working days after the session(s) for which the pupil was absent.

- Call the parent on each day that the absence continues without explanation, to make sure proper safeguarding action is taken where necessary. If absence continues, the school will consider involving an education welfare officer.
- Where relevant, report the unexplained absence to the pupil's youth offending team officer.
- Where appropriate, offer support to the pupil and/or their parents to improve attendance.
- Identify whether the pupil needs support from wider partners, as quickly as possible, and make the necessary referrals.
- Where support is not appropriate, not successful, or not engaged with, issue a notice to improve, penalty notice or other legal intervention, as appropriate.

Leave of absence requests

The headteacher will allow pupils to be absent from the school site for certain educational activities, or to attend other schools or settings.

The headteacher will only grant a leave of absence to a pupil during term time if the request meets the specific circumstances set out in the [School Attendance \(Pupil Registration\) \(England\) Regulations 2024](#).

These circumstances are:

- Taking part in a regulated performance, or regulated employment abroad
- Attending an interview
- Study leave
- A temporary, time-limited part-time timetable
- Exceptional circumstances

We define 'exceptional circumstances' as one-off events which are unavoidable. They should be of unique and significant emotional, educational or spiritual value to the child which outweighs the loss of teaching time (as determined by the headteacher). The fundamental principles for defining 'exceptional' are events that are 'rare, significant, unavoidable and short'. By 'unavoidable' we mean an event that could not reasonably be scheduled at another time, outside of school term time, regardless of who has planned or paid for the holiday or absence (including grandparents or other family or friends).

Examples of exceptional circumstances may include the death of a close relative, attendance at a funeral, or a housing crisis which prevents attendance.

Leave of absence will not be granted for a pupil to take part in protest activity during school hours.

The school may discuss the leave of absence request with other education settings and/or the local authority to determine any exceptional circumstances.

As a leave of absence will only be granted in exceptional circumstances, irrespective of the child's overall attendance, it is unlikely a leave of absence will be granted for the purposes of a family holiday **unless there are highly exceptional circumstances**, for example, a terminal diagnosis in the case of a parent.

A leave of absence is granted at the headteacher's discretion, including the length of time the pupil is authorised to be absent for. The school considers each application for term-time absence individually, taking into account the specific facts, circumstances and relevant background context behind the request.

Any request should be submitted as soon as it is anticipated and, where possible, at least two weeks before the absence, and in accordance with the leave of absence request form, available from the school office. The headteacher may require evidence to support any request for leave of absence.

If leave of absence is authorised, the school will not provide work for children to do during their absence. Parents are however advised to read with their children and encourage them to write a diary while they are away.

Where a parent removes a child after their application for leave was refused or where no application was made to the school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised. It is likely that penalty notices will be requested, in line with the National Framework and Central Bedfordshire Council's Code of Conduct for Fixed Penalty Notices, in respect of each parent believed to have allowed the absence.

Other reasons the school may allow a pupil to be absent from the school site, which are not classified as absences, include (but are not limited to):

- Attending an offsite approved educational activity, sporting activity or visit or trip arranged by the school
- Attending another school at which the pupil is also registered (dual registration)
- Attending provision arranged by the local authority
- Attending work experience
- If there is any other unavoidable cause for the pupil not to attend school, such as disruption to travel caused by an emergency, a lack of access arrangements, or because the school premises are closed

If term-time leave is not granted, taking a pupil out of school will be recorded as an unauthorised absence and may result in sanctions, such as a penalty notice. The school cannot grant leave of absence retrospectively; therefore, any absences that were not approved by the school in advance will be marked as unauthorised.

Sanctions

Our school will make use of the full range of potential sanctions – including, but not limited to, those listed below – to tackle poor attendance. Decisions will be made on an individual, case-by-case basis.

Penalty notices

The headteacher (or someone authorised by them), local authority or the police can fine parents for the unauthorised absence of their child from school, where the child is of compulsory school age, by issuing a penalty notice.

The school will issue a penalty notice in line with Central Bedfordshire Council's Code of Conduct for Fixed Penalty Notices.

Before issuing a penalty notice, the school will consider the individual case, including:

- Whether the national threshold for considering a penalty notice has been met (10 sessions of unauthorised absence in a rolling period of 10 school weeks). The 10 sessions of absence do not have to be consecutive and can be made up of a combination of any type of unauthorised absence (G, O and/or U coded within the school's registers). The 10-school week period can span different terms, school years or education settings.
- Whether a penalty notice is the best available tool to improve attendance for that pupil.
- Whether further support, a notice to improve or another legal intervention would be a more appropriate solution.
- Whether any obligations that the school has under the Equality Act 2010 make issuing a penalty notice inappropriate.

A penalty notice may also be issued where parents allow their child to be present in a public place during school hours without reasonable justification, during the first 5 days of a suspension or exclusion (where the school has notified the parents that the pupil must not be present in a public place on that day).

Each parent who is liable for the pupil's offence(s) can be issued with a penalty notice, but this will usually only be the parent/parents who allowed the absence. This means that if a mother and father have two children and take both children out of school, they may be issued with four penalty notices – one to each parent of each child.

The payment must be made directly to the local authority, regardless of who issues the notice. If the payment has not been made after 28 days, the local authority can decide whether to prosecute or withdraw the notice.

If issued with a **first** penalty notice, the parent must pay £80 within 21 days, or £160 within 28 days.

If a **second** penalty notice is issued to the same parent in respect of the same pupil, the parent must pay £160 if paid within 28 days.

A **third** penalty notice cannot be issued to the same parent in respect of the same child within 3 years of the date of the issue of the first penalty notice. In a case where the national threshold is met for a third time within those 3 years, the matter may be referred to the local authority for consideration of prosecution via the Magistrates Court. If prosecution is instigated for irregular school attendance, each parent may receive a fine of up to £2500 and/or up to 3 months in prison. If a parent is found guilty in court, they will receive a criminal conviction.

Once a penalty notice has been issued, there is no statutory right of appeal.

Notices to improve

If the national threshold has been met and support is appropriate, but parents do not engage with offers of support, the school may offer a notice to improve to give parents a final chance to engage with support.

Notices to improve will be issued in line with processes set out in the local authority's code of conduct.

They will include:

- Details of the pupil's attendance record and of the offences.
- The benefits of regular attendance and the duty of parents under [section 7 of the Education Act 1996](#).
- Details of the support provided so far.
- Opportunities for further support, or to access previously provided support that was not engaged with.
- A clear warning that a penalty notice may be issued if attendance doesn't improve within the improvement period, along with details of what sufficient improvement looks like, which will be decided on a case-by-case basis.
- A clear timeframe of between 3 and 6 weeks for the improvement period.
- The grounds on which a penalty notice may be issued before the end of the improvement period.

Strategies for promoting attendance

We believe in developing good patterns of attendance and set high expectations for the attendance and punctuality for all our pupils from the outset. It is a central part of our school's vision, values, ethos and day to day life. We recognise the strong connections between attendance, attainment, safeguarding and wellbeing.

Helping to create a pattern of regular attendance is the responsibility of parents, pupils and all members of school staff. Good attendance will be celebrated and communicated in a variety of ways, including through assemblies, newsletters and displays.

To help us all to focus on this, we will:

- Promote the benefits of high attendance through all possible channels.
- Build strong relationships and work jointly with families.
- Give parents details on attendance on our school website and in newsletters.
- Report to parents on their child's attendance and the impact on their progress.
- Celebrate excellent attendance by displaying and reporting individual and class achievements.
- Reward good or improving attendance.
- Contact parents should their child's attendance fall below the school's target for attendance.
- Submit a daily attendance return to the Department of Education and local authority, in line with the legal expectations placed on all schools.
- Accurately complete admission and attendance registers and have effective day to day processes in place to follow-up absence as required by law.

Reporting to parents

We will regularly inform parents about their child's attendance and absence levels. This will be done via regular reports and letters.

Understanding barriers to attendance

We understand that barriers to attendance are complex, and that some pupils find it harder than others to attend school; therefore, we will continue to prioritise cultivating a safe and supportive environment at school, as well as strong and trusting relationships with pupils and parents.

Whilst any child may occasionally have time off school because they are too unwell to attend, sometimes they can be reluctant to attend school. Any barriers preventing regular attendance are best resolved between the school, the parents and the child. We will work with that family to understand the root problem and provide any necessary support. We may use outside agencies to help with this, such as the School Nurse, Mental Health Service, Early Help Worker/Social Worker/Family Support Worker or the relevant local authority team/s. Where outside agencies are supporting the family, parents may be invited to attend a Team Around the Child meeting (TAC) to consider what is working well and what needs to improve. An individual support plan will be agreed and subsequently reviewed.

Some pupils face greater barriers to attendance than their peers. These can include pupils who suffer from long-term medical conditions or who have special educational needs and disabilities, or other vulnerabilities. High expectations of attendance remain in place for these pupils, however we will work with families and pupils to support improved attendance whilst being mindful of the additional barriers faced. We can discuss reasonable adjustments and additional support from external partners, where appropriate.

To support the attendance of pupils with SEND and/or health issues, the school will consider:

- Holding termly meetings to evaluate any implemented reasonable adjustments
- Incorporating a pastoral support plan
- Carrying out a strengths and difficulties questionnaire
- Identifying pupils' unmet needs through the Common Assessment Framework
- Using an internal or external specialist
- Ensuring a pupil can have somewhere quiet to spend lunch and breaktimes
- Implementing a system whereby pupils can request to leave a classroom if they feel they need time out
- Temporary late starts or early finishes
- Phased returns to school where there has been a long absence
- Small group work or one-to-one lessons
- Tailored support to meet their individual needs
- Making a BRIF referral for the family under Early Help

Under the DfE's statutory guidance, schools are required to submit a sickness return to the local authority for all pupils who have missed/are likely to miss 15 or more school days (consecutive or cumulative) due to medical reasons/illness.

Attendance monitoring, analysis and support

We monitor and analyse attendance and absence data (including punctuality) half-termly, termly and yearly across the school and at an individual pupil, year group and cohort level in order to identify and support individual pupils or groups of pupils when their attendance needs to improve or may be a cause for concern. The school has granted the DfE and local authority access to its management information system so the data can be accessed regularly and securely.

Persistently and severely absent pupils are tracked and monitored more regularly and supported accordingly.

We conduct thorough analysis of our data to identify patterns and trends as well as look at historic and emerging patterns of attendance and absence to support us in developing strategies to address these patterns.

We share information and work collaboratively with other schools in the area, local authorities, and other partners, when absence is at risk of becoming persistent or severe.

The school also benchmarks its attendance data against local, regional, and national levels to identify areas for improvement, and shares this with the governing body.

Following the analysis of our data we will:

- Develop targeted actions to address patterns of absence (of all severities) of individual pupils, groups or cohorts that have been identified via data analysis.
- Provide targeted support to the pupils we have identified whose absences may be a cause for concern, especially those who demonstrate patterns of persistent or severe absence, and their families.
- Provide regular attendance reports to class teachers, to facilitate discussions with pupils and families, and to the governing body and school leaders (including the SENCo, Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL), Pupil Premium Lead).
- Use further data to monitor and evaluate the impact of any interventions put in place in order to modify them and inform future strategies.

Training staff

The school recognises that early intervention can prevent poor attendance. As such, staff will receive training in identifying potentially at-risk pupils as part of their induction and refresher training.

The governing body will ensure that teachers and support staff receive training in line with this policy as part of their induction. Following this initial training, staff will receive regular and ongoing training as part of their development. A key message will be that '**attendance is everyone's responsibility**' just as it is for safeguarding.

Training will cover at least the following:

- The importance of good attendance and the impact of poor attendance.
- That absence is almost invariably a result of wider circumstances.
- The legal requirements on schools e.g. the keeping of registers.
- The school's strategies and procedures for monitoring and improving attendance.
- The school's procedures for multi-agency working to provide intensive support for pupils who need it.

The governing body will provide dedicated and enhanced attendance training to the attendance lead and other staff with specific attendance functions in their role – this will include training regarding interpreting and analysing attendance data and supporting pupils to overcome barriers to attendance.

Staff will receive training to ensure they understand that increased absence from school could indicate a safeguarding concern and know how such concerns should be managed.

Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed as guidance from the local authority and/or DfE is updated, and as a minimum every two years by the headteacher. At every review, the policy will be approved by the full governing body.

Appendix 1

Persistent and severe absence

Persistent absence:

Missing 10 percent or more of schooling across the year for any reason.

Severe absence:

Missing 50 percent or more of schooling across the year for any reason.

Reducing persistent and severe absence

Reducing persistent and severe absence is central to the school's strategy for improving attendance. The school will use a number of methods to help support pupils at risk of persistent absence to attend school.

These include:

- Considering potential safeguarding issues and, where suspected or present, addressing them in line with Keeping Children Safe in Education.
- Offering catch-up support to build confidence and bridge gaps.
- Holding regular meetings with the parents of pupils who the school (and/or local authority) considers to be vulnerable or at risk of persistent or severe absence, or who are persistently or severely absent, to:
 - Establish plans to remove barriers and provide additional support
 - Discuss attendance and engagement at school
 - Listen and understand barriers to attendance
 - Explain the help that is available
 - Explain the potential consequences of, and sanctions for, persistent and severe absence
 - Review any existing actions or interventions
- Providing access to wider support services to remove the barriers to attendance, in conjunction with the local authority, where relevant.
- Considering alternative support that could be put in place to remove any barriers to attendance and re-engage these pupils. In doing so, the school will sensitively consider some of the reasons for absence.
- Implementing sanctions, where necessary.

Appendix 3

Monitoring, analysis and support procedures

We have adopted the following attendance procedures, to ensure that pupils' attendance meets the expected standard and effective intervention is provided where pupils' attendance falls below the standard:

1. A spreadsheet is used by the Senior Attendance Champion and shared with the Senior Leadership team (SLT) detailing half-termly, termly and annual attendance to date including attendance percentage, reasons for absence and actions taken/required.
2. Attendance is discussed with class teachers. Any attendance and/or punctuality trends noticed by staff are passed immediately to the Senior Attendance Champion and SLT.
3. If a pupil's attendance is a cause for concern or patterns/trends are noted, the school will contact parents to discuss any issues or problems, and ascertain how the school can help to improve the pupil's attendance. The attendance will continue to be monitored closely for improvement by the school.
4. The pupil's attendance is monitored for an agreed period and, if attendance does not improve after this time, parents are required to attend a meeting in school where targets are set. If parents are unwilling to engage, or genuinely unable to attend, a referral may be made to the School Attendance Officer (this will be discussed with them prior to making the referral).
5. Monitoring and communication with the family will continue until attendance stabilises. If targets are not met, the Senior Attendance Champion will discuss further actions with the School Attendance Officer.

Attendance Action Trigger Points

The Senior Attendance Champion will monitor attendance as above and follow the procedure below:

1. Attendance is $\leq 90\%$ (Autumn term) or $\leq 95\%$ (Spring and Summer terms)
 - Letter 1 sent home and attendance monitored
 - Class teacher informed
2. Attendance improves
 - Improved attendance letter sent home
3. Attendance does not improve or declines
 - Letter 2 sent home and correspondence log kept
 - Support meeting arranged where necessary
 - Class teacher involved
 - School Attendance Officer alerted
4. Attendance improves
 - Improved attendance letter sent home
5. Attendance does not improve or declines
 - Senior Attendance Champion, SLT and class teacher informed of pupil's weekly attendance
 - Letter 3 sent home and meeting arranged with the parent and School Attendance Officer
 - Regular review meetings held (at least 4 weekly)
 - Legal interventions considered with the School Attendance Officer
6. Further decline in attendance
 - Matter referred to the local authority for relevant legal sanctions

During a support meeting a personalised action/support plan, such as an attendance contract will be completed, to address any barriers to attendance and make clear each person's role in improving the attendance patterns of the pupil. As part of this process signposting support to other agencies or services will be given, if appropriate.

Appendix 4

Missing children

Pupils will not be permitted to leave the school premises during the school day unless they have permission from the school. The following procedures will be taken in the event of a pupil going missing whilst at school:

- The member of staff who has noticed the missing pupil will inform the headteacher immediately.
- The office staff will also be informed as they will act as a point of contact for receiving information regarding the search.
- A member of staff will stay with the rest of the class and all other available members of staff will conduct a thorough search of the school premises as directed by the headteacher.
- The following areas will be systematically searched:
 - All classrooms
 - All toilets
 - School hall
 - Library
 - Any outbuildings
 - The school grounds
- Available staff will begin a search of the area immediately outside of the school premises and will take a mobile phone with them so they can be contacted.
- If the pupil has not been found after a thorough search, then the parents of the pupil will be notified.
- The school will attempt to contact parents using the emergency contact numbers provided.
- If the parents have had no contact from the pupil, and the emergency contacts list has been exhausted, the police will be contacted.
- A member of staff will record this on CPOMS, describing all circumstances leading up to the pupil going missing and the outcome.
- If the missing pupil has an allocated social worker, is a looked-after child, or has any SEND, then the appropriate personnel will be informed.
- When the pupil has been located, members of staff will care for and talk to the pupil to ensure they are safe and well.
- Parents and any other agencies will be informed immediately when the pupil has been located.

The headteacher will take the appropriate action to ensure that pupils understand they must not leave the premises and sanctions will be issued if deemed necessary. Appropriate disciplinary procedures will be followed in accordance with the Behaviour Policy.

The headteacher will carry out a full investigation and will draw a conclusion as to how the incident occurred. Policies and procedures will be reviewed in accordance with the outcome, where necessary.

Appendix 5

Deletion from roll

For any pupil leaving the school, other than at the end of Year 4, parents are required to complete a 'Pupils moving from school' form which can be obtained from the school office. This provides the school with the following information:

- Child's name
- Class
- Current address
- Date of leaving
- New home address
- Name of new school
- Address of new school

This information is essential to ensure that we know the whereabouts and may appropriately safeguard all of our pupils, even those who leave us.

It is crucial that parents keep school updated with current addresses and contact details for the pupil and key family members, in case of emergency.

Under Pupil Regulations 2006, all schools are now **legally required** to notify their local authority of **every new entry** to the admission register **within 5 days** of the pupil being enrolled. In addition to this, **every deletion** from the school register must also be notified to the local authority, as soon as the ground for deletion has been met in relation to that pupil, and in any event no later than the time at which the pupil's name is deleted from the register. This duty does not apply when a pupil's name is removed from the admission register at a standard transition point – when the pupil has completed the final year of education normally provided by that school.

Penalty Notice Fines for absence from school are changing

From 19th August 2024 Penalty Notice fines
increase to £160 for each parent, for each child.



You can be fined if your child has
a total of 5 days of unauthorised
absences in 10 school weeks, for
things like:

- being late after the register
has closed
- truancy
- taking a holiday without
permission from the school
- or if a headteacher isn't satisfied
for the reason for missing school

Over a rolling 3-year period the
sanctions are:

- 1st offence – £160 reduced
to £80 if paid within 21 days
- 2nd offence – £160
- 3rd offence – Court hearing
and up to £2,500 fine, or
up to 3 months in prison
and a criminal record
